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Dozens convicted during administrative court sessions

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – The Mecklenburg County District Attorney's Office convicted dozens of defendants during administrative court sessions held in Superior Court between June 1, 2026 – June 30, 2026. The defendants entered their guilty pleas in courtroom 5310 before the Honorable Carla N. Archie, the Honorable George C. Bell, and the Honorable David H. Strickland, Superior Court Judges.

Among those convicted were the following:

Khalil Bass, 23, pled guilty to second-degree murder. Judge Archie sentenced him to 157-201 months in prison.

Adilio Lemus, 26, pled guilty to 1) second-degree murder, 2) felony conspiracy, 3) first-degree burglary, 4) two counts of robbery with a dangerous weapon, and 5) conspiracy to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon. Judge Archie sentenced him to 300-372 months in prison.

Sidney Cain, 45, pled guilty to 1) involuntary manslaughter, 2) felony hit and run resulting in serious injury or death, and 3) driving while impaired. For the involuntary manslaughter charge, Judge Archie sentenced Cain to 23-37 months in prison. For the remaining charges, she was sentenced to a consecutive sentence of 23-37 months in prison totaling 46-74 months in prison.

Trinity Thompson, 24, pled guilty to 1) robbery with a dangerous weapon, 2) conspiracy to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon, and 3) involuntary manslaughter. For the robbery with a dangerous weapon charge, Judge Bell sentenced Thompson to 60-84 months in prison. For the conspiracy charge, she received a consecutive sentence of 23-40 months in prison, and she received a consecutive sentence of 13-25 months in prison for the remaining charge.

Zavia Jeter, 23, pled guilty to 1) robbery with a dangerous weapon, 2) conspiracy to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon, and 3) involuntary manslaughter. For the robbery with a dangerous weapon charge, Judge Bell sentenced Thompson to 60-84 months in prison. For the conspiracy charge, she received a consecutive sentence of 23-40 months in prison, and she received a consecutive sentence of 13-25 months in prison for the remaining charge.

Ja'Quavion Davis-Hudson, 19, pled guilty to second-degree murder. Judge Bell sentenced him to 216-272 months in prison.

Zion Jennings, 19, pled guilty to 1) second-degree murder, 2) conspiracy to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon, and 3) conspiracy to commit discharging a weapon into an occupied vehicle in operation. Judge Bell sentenced Jennings to 157-201 months in prison.

Dreshon Moreno, 23, pled guilty to conspiracy to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon. Judge Bell sentenced him to 31-50 months in prison.

Willie Burnette, 62, pled guilty to habitual larceny. He also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Bell sentenced him to 103-136 months in prison.

Antonio Shine, 22, pled guilty to two counts of discharging a weapon into an occupied dwelling. Judge Bell sentenced Shine to 44-65 months in prison.

Antonio Harris, 42, pled guilty to felony larceny. He also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Bell sentenced Harris to 77-105 months in prison.

Thomas Williams, 58, pled guilty to 1) breaking or entering a motor vehicle, 2) larceny of a firearm, and 3) possession of firearm by a convicted felon. He also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Bell sentenced him to 77-105 months in prison.

Robert Gordon, 44, pled guilty to 1) felony breaking or entering and 2) larceny after breaking or entering. Gordon also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Archie sentenced him to 77-105 months in prison.

Tyrie Phifer, 19, pled guilty to 1) robbery with a dangerous weapon and 2) common law robbery. Judge Bell sentenced him to 51-74 months in prison.

Duval Pompey, 48, pled guilty to 1) felony larceny and 2) four counts of felony breaking or entering. He also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Archie sentenced him to 44-65 months in prison.

Stephen Atkinson, 45, pled guilty to attempted obtaining property by false pretenses. Judge Archie sentenced him to 12-24 months in prison.

Luis Avila, 35, pled guilty to discharging a weapon into occupied property. Judge Archie sentenced him to 20-36 months in prison; that sentence was suspended pending his successful completion of 24 months of supervised probation.

Jaquarius Brown, 22, pled guilty to 1) common law robbery and 2) assault inflicting serious injury. Judge Bell sentenced him to 12-24 months in prison; that sentence was suspended pending his successful completion of 36 months of supervised probation. As a condition of the probation, Brown must serve a split sentence of 90 days in jail.

Quen'tavius Dye, 31, pled guilty to possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. Judge Archie sentenced him to 17-30 months in prison.

Tony Funderburk, 38, pled guilty to felony obstruction of justice. Judge Archie sentenced him to 9-20 months in prison.

George Kantner, 71, pled guilty to 1) possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and 2) misdemeanor carrying a concealed gun. Judge Archie sentenced him to 22-36 months in prison.

Lakisha Redfear, 41, pled guilty to felony flee to elude arrest with a motor vehicle. Judge Bell sentenced her to 8-19 months in prison.

Deandre Sherrill, 31, pled guilty to attempted common law robbery. Judge Archie sentenced him to 8-19 months in prison.

Zachary Spann, 30, pled guilty to possession of firearm by a convicted felon. Judge Archie sentenced him to 19-32 months in prison.

Keishorne Wright, 31, pled guilty to 1) attempted level I trafficking fentanyl by transportation and 2) felony carrying a concealed gun. Judge Strickland sentenced him to 16-29 months in prison.

Jason Dees, 43, pled guilty to possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. He also admitted his status as a habitual felon. Judge Strickland sentenced Dees to 80-108 months in prison.

James Webber, 54, pled guilty to common law robbery. Judge Strickland sentenced him to 10-21 months in prison.
